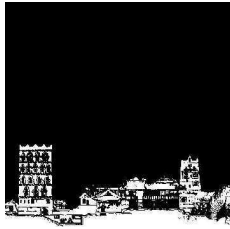

WELCOME

Welcome to the biennial conference of the International Association for the Study of Traditional Environments (IASTE). The theme of our 2018 meeting in Portugal is “The Politics of Tradition.” Past IASTE conferences have dealt with themes as diverse as Value, Myth, Utopia, Border and many others. This conference intends to prolong this collective reflection by foregrounding an examination of the ways in which traditions in the built environment and the domain of the political are related. While the traditions of the political have always been part of the debate at IASTE conferences, at a time of struggles globally around the meaning and the practices of political participation in making the built environment, it is valuable to address how the built environment has been shaped by state apparatuses or by citizens to advance diverse political position; often deploying imaginaries of tradition or purportedly rejecting emerging spatial practices and political subjectivities.

Consequently, the conference will offer reflections both on the importance of the concept of tradition for the political question in itself and on the ways in which variants of governance structures face the question of tradition in the built environment. Participants are encouraged to question the practice of tradition in the production of space in relation to different regimes of politics. In addition, the conference will examine the systems of politics as a category of tradition, reflecting on how the construction and deconstruction of professional political bodies act on the built environment.

Hosted by the University of Coimbra, the conference brings together over 200 scholars and practitioners from a variety of backgrounds to present papers structured around three broad themes: “Traditions of Everyday Social Practices and the Shaping of Traditional Built Environments”; “Theorizing the Political from the Spaces of Traditional Environments”; and “Tradition, Politics, and the Built Environment.”

CONFERENCE SITE

The conference will be held at the Convent São Francisco Convention Centre. It is located on the left bank of Rio Mondego overlooking the city and the University of Coimbra.

CONFERENCE TOUR (OCTOBER 5, 2018) – Free with conference registration

The tour will take place on the afternoon of the second day of the conference and will be carried out by four guides. It is offered for all participants and will be divided into groups of 25. The first part of the tour consists in visiting the old university and the upper town district. It will take place from 14:15 to 16:15. The visit will start at the same time for the four groups from four different starting points. The attractions include the baroque university library; the university's ceremonial graduation hall; the Roman cryptoporticus at the Machado de Castro National Museum; the Jesuit church and the fascist university buildings. Each of the visits has an estimated time of 30 minutes.

The second part of the tour will start (after a break) at 16.30 for the first groups and 16.45 for the last groups. All will descend Coimbra's historic center towards Coimbra's Romanesque Cathedral. The tour will then proceed with visits to Almedina city gate and the Praça Velha in downtown Coimbra; Santa Cruz church and the tombs of the first kings of Portugal; and finally Sophia Street, the Renaissance college street. The estimated end time will be 18.30 for the first two groups and 18.45 for the last.

POST-CONFERENCE TRIPS

As with all IASTE conferences, participants may decide to travel in the region after the conference. If there is enough interest, IASTE will negotiate with a travel agency to offer optional tours at participants' own expense.

COIMBRA REGION (OCTOBER 8, 2018) – 85 Euros (to be confirmed)

The trip begins with a ride to Montemor-o-Velho where the participants will visit the urban interventions in the historical center – the Municipal Square (Alexandre Herculano Prize, 2003) and the Assisted Pedestrian Path (AICA Prize, 2013) – on the way up to the Castle. Here coffee will be served at the Paço das Infantas Tea House (1997-2000), while enjoying the views overlooking the rice paddies of the Lower Mondego. The tour will continue to Buçaco for lunch at the Palace Hotel and a relaxed walk, in the afternoon, around the surrounding Park and National Woods to see the former hermitage constructions. On the way back to Coimbra, there will be a wine tasting at the Casa de Sarmento Winery (2010-2017).

PORTO (OCTOBER 8, 2018) – 95 Euros (to be confirmed)

The historical city of Porto is a UNESCO World Heritage classified site. The trip includes a visit to the coastal sea swimming pool by Álvaro Siza, the Serralves Gardens and Museum and, in the afternoon, the Cathedral as well as the Ribeira buildings, streets, and river piers. A Port Wine tasting at the cellars in Gaia and a cable car transfer to the Serra de Pilar at sunset complete the journey.
